Job Description

The successful candidate will have a demonstrated ability to design and teach non-credit classes for working adults and union members. The Career Instructor will also be expected to pursue applied research projects on work and employment issues. These projects should be capable of attracting external funding or support.

Qualifications:

Required

- Master's degree required in social sciences, education, or other relevant field. In exceptional circumstances a Bachelor's degree with extensive experience will be considered.
- Demonstrated interest in, and commitment to, issues affecting workers and unions
- Relevant teaching experience (e.g., classroom teaching, training, workshop facilitation)
- Strong oral, written, and interpersonal communications skills
- Ability to work with a diverse range of constituents on work and employment issues



Preferred

- Two or more years of experience working with labor unions or other worker organizations
- Experience with curriculum development, teaching labor education, or conducting popular or adult education classes
- Track record of producing applied research funded by external sources
- Experience in working with racially and ethnically diverse communities
