




Jenny Carson's A Matter of Moral Justice; Black Women Laundry Workers and the Fight for Justice

Lisa Phillips spoke to Jenny Carson about her new book, <u>A Matter of Moral Justice</u>, on Black women laundry workers in New York. It was recently published by the University of Illinois Press.

Carson highlights how race and gender shaped worker conditions, labor organizing, and union politics.

She is a historian of twentieth-century American women's labour history with a focus on the history of service work and women's organizing in the United States.
